

TYPES OF POETRY

A poem is a form of creative writing that uses imaginative language, rhythm, and sometimes rhyme to express emotions, ideas, or stories.

- **Structure:** Written in lines and stanzas (verses) rather than paragraphs.
- **Focus on Sound:** Uses rhythm, rhyme, repetition, and alliteration to create a musical effect.
- **Imagery:** Employs descriptive language to create vivid mental pictures or sensory experiences
- **Concise Language:** Focuses on choosing precise, powerful words to express complex feelings or ideas.

Acrostic

Acrostic: poetry in which the first letter of each line, when read vertically, spell out a word. The word is usually the subject of the poem. Also called a name poem.

Haiku

Haiku: an ancient Japanese form with no rhyme. Haiku often deal with nature. This type of poetry has three lines with a fixed number of syllables:

Line 1= 5 syllables

Line 2= 7 syllables

Line 3= 5 syllables

Couplets

Couplets: two-line poems with a fun and simple rhyming pattern. Each line has the same meter and their endings rhyme with one another. Couplets are often humorous.

Cinquain

Cinquain: a form consisting of five lines. Each has a required number of syllables, and a specific topic.

Line 1: Title (noun)- 2

syllables Line 2:

Description- 4 syllables

Line 3: Action- 6 syllables

Line 4: Feeling (phrase)- 8 syllables

Line 5: Title (synonym for the title)- 2 syllables

Diamante Diamante poems: diamond-shaped poems of seven lines that are written using parts of speech. Limericks Limericks: humorous, rhyming five line poems with a specific rhythm pattern and rhyme scheme. Lines one, two, and five rhyme with each other and lines three and four rhyme with each other. Elegy An elegy is a reflective, melancholy poem that laments the death of an individual or mourns the loss of something cherished, typically moving from grief toward consolation or acceptance. https://youtu.be/KSs_0C-GwKs?si=XvcZ3BoFU4ucevt6	Ma Angelic she was resilient— she never quit strong like a diamond radiance glittered like gold love so gentle yet so strong

Blank Verse Blank verse is poetry written with a precise meter—almost always iambic pentameter—but without end rhymes. Epic An epic poem is a long, exalted narrative poem that details the extraordinary adventures of a hero, often reflecting the cultural values of a nation or civilization. https://youtu.be/zrNU4sEK-tA?si=tKjWwwHxm3jVMp5K	The <i>Odyssey</i> by Homer (~8th Century BCE): Follows Odysseus's ten-year journey home after the Trojan War.
