HOW'S MY DRIVING? ASK MY CAR

Using gadgets while you're driving can be a very bad thing, but an expert on automotive distractions says using a gadget that watches you (1).....

"People don't always understand the degree of distraction they may be exposing themselves to ... so the idea is to help people understand that distraction by providing them with feedback," says John D. Lee. Lee outlines the magnitude of the problem: More than 40,000 people die every year in motor vehicle crashes, (2)..... - including distractions or drowsiness - probably played a role in most of those crashes.

Crashes and near-crashes are about three times as likely to happen (3) (such as dialing a phone or even texting), and twice as likely during a moderately complex task (such as inserting a CD), Lee reported.

As new technologies are introduced, the list of potential distractions keeps getting longer. Of course, most drivers overestimate their own abilities: In one survey, 88 percent of the respondents judged themselves to be safer than the average driver.

Gossiping with the girls

Women are experts at gossiping, and they always talk about trivial things or at least that's what men have always thought. However, some new research suggests that when women talk to women, their conversations are far from frivolous, cover more topics (up to 40 subjects) than when men talk to other men. Women's conversations range from health to their houses, from politics to fashion, from movies to family, from education to relationship problems. Sports are notably absent. Men tend to have a limited range of subjects, the most popular being work, sports, jokes, cars and women.

According to professor Petra Boynton, a psychologist who interview over 1000 women, women also tend to move quickly from one subject to another in conversation, while men usually stick to one subject for longer periods of time.

At work, this difference can be an advantage for men, as they can put other matters aside concentrate fully on the topic being discussed. On the other hand, it also means that they sometimes find it hard to concentrate when several things have to be discussed at the same time in a meeting.



Professor Boynton also says that men and women talk for different reasons. In social situation women use conversation to solve problems and reduce stress while men talk with each other to laugh or to compare opinions.
