The history of detective fiction

When did the genre come into existence and why is it so popular?

¹ ___ Poetry and drama were the first literary forms, so perhaps we should look here for early fictional detectives. Hamlet, the main character in Shakespeare's drama written around 1600, could be thought of as a detective. Sure that a crime had been committed, he used a play to reveal the truth about his father's murder. However, the first true detective writers in English were Edgar Allan Poe and Wilkie Collins, in the 19th century.

² ___ The 'golden age' of detective fiction came in the early 20th century, which is when the novels of Agatha Christie featuring Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple became popular. Christie's skill lay in setting up a puzzle and revealing information bit by bit which ultimately led to a neat solution. In reaction to this somewhat simplified picture, American authors started writing novels about organized crime, with their tough detectives facing unexpected and dangerous situations.

³ ___ The detectives themselves are at the heart of most crime fiction, but there is often another important 'character'. The attraction of an unfamiliar setting and culture draws many readers to this genre; Sherlock Holmes takes us to 19th century London, Maigret to post-war Paris and Montalbano to modern-day Sicily. Certain settings have become particularly popular recently, such as Scandinavia, whose cold climate and long dark nights have provided fertile territory for atmospheric TV series.

⁴ ___ Avid readers of detective novels adore seeing their heroes on screen. Some actors in much-loved TV adaptations are hard to separate from the fictional characters they play. Crime fiction is ideally suited to movie and TV because the plot, characters and locations are all important. Who doesn't enjoy watching their favourite hero striding across a Scottish hillside or relaxing on a West Indian beach, getting to know the local people and their customs?

⁵ ___ Although some of us enjoy escaping to a comfortable and predictable fictional world, others are looking for a more risky life between the covers of a book. Luckily, we can experience detective stories which appeal to all tastes. There is a huge range to be explored – from realistic contemporary police detectives bringing vicious murderers to justice to 16th century lawyers involved in historical events.

⁶ ___ But there's one common feature of crime fiction that applies to it in all its forms and which probably accounts for its popularity. Whatever surprises the story holds, at the end of the novel the guilty person is revealed. This is immensely satisfying for the reader. Not only do we get to understand how the detective solved the puzzle, but we take comfort from the fact that the perpetrator of the crime will be punished.
