It was a regular Tuesday morning, the kind where everything felt the same as the day before. The bell rang sharply at 8:00 AM, and students poured into Jefferson High's hallways like a flood. I walked into my first-period history class, slid into my usual seat near the back, and pulled out my notebook. I didn't expect that this day would be the one that changed the way I saw myself—and others.

We had a new student that day. His name was Daniel. He was quiet, with glasses too big for his face and a backpack that looked twice his size. The teacher introduced him, and he gave a shy nod to the class. No one said much. When he walked past to take a seat, I saw a few students snicker and whisper. I recognized the looks—the judgment, the silent exclusion. I'd seen it before. Later that day, during lunch, I noticed Daniel sitting alone in the far corner of the cafeteria, poking at his food. I hesitated. Part of me wanted to walk over and invite him to my table, but another part of me was afraid—afraid of what my friends would say, afraid of standing out. I stayed where I was and told myself, 'Maybe tomorrow.'

The turning point came in gym class. We were playing dodgeball, and teams were being picked. No one chose Daniel. He stood there awkwardly until the teacher assigned him to a team. During the game, some kids purposely threw the ball too hard when aiming at him, cheering when he got hit. At one point, he fell, and instead of helping, someone laughed and said, "Maybe gym isn't for guys like you." I froze. I wanted to do something, to say something—but fear held me back again. The bell rang, ending the class and releasing us into the halls. As Daniel picked himself up, brushing dirt off his shirt, his eyes met mine. They weren't angry or teary. They were just tired. That look stayed with me the rest of the day.

That night, I couldn't sleep. I kept replaying everything in my head. I remembered what my mother always told me: "Kindness is a choice, but it's also a responsibility." I realized I had chosen silence. And in doing so, I had let someone feel alone and unwanted. The next morning, I made up my mind. I walked into school a little earlier than usual and found Daniel sitting alone by his locker. My heart was pounding, but I walked over and said, "Hey. You want to sit with me at lunch today?"

He looked up, surprised. "Really?"

"Yeah," I nodded. "And maybe we can shoot some hoops after school? I saw you dribbling a bit in gym. You've got some good moves."

He smiled. It was small, but genuine. "Sure. That'd be cool."

When lunchtime came, I waved him over. Some of my friends *raised their eyebrows*, but no one said anything. Daniel sat next to me, and we started talking—about video games, books, random stuff. Turned out, he was hilarious once he relaxed. Over the next few days, people began to notice. Others started talking to him too. The whispers stopped. The jokes faded.

Looking back, I learned that standing up isn't always about big speeches or dramatic gestures. Sometimes, it's just about walking over to someone and saying, "You're not alone." I also learned that courage doesn't mean not being afraid—it means acting despite the fear. Daniel and I became good friends. We still hang out. And whenever I see someone left out or laughed at, I remember how it felt to stay silent—and how much better it felt to finally do something.

That one small act changed not only Daniel's experience at school but mine too. It reminded me that we all have the power to make someone's day better—or worse—through our choices. In a world that often pushes us to fit in, it takes strength to stand out for the right reasons. But when we do, we inspire others to do the same. And maybe, just maybe, that's how change really begins.

Solar Energy in Malaysia

Solar energy has gained momentum in Malaysia, offering an environmentally friendly and cost-effective solution to power needs. As a tropical country blessed with year-round sunshine, Malaysia has significant potential for solar energy adoption. Many Malaysians, including myself, have started embracing this renewable source to reduce electricity bills and contribute to a greener future.

I decided to install solar panels on my home's rooftop a few years ago. The process was smoother than expected, thanks to government incentives like the Feed-in Tariff (FiT) scheme.

For me, the reduction in monthly electricity bills was immediately noticeable. Over time, the savings added up, and the initial cost of installation started to feel worthwhile. 28. But then again, this depends on how many panels you have as well as your monthly bills.

What truly amazed me was the durability and low maintenance of the solar photovoltaic (PV) system. 29. Moreover, advancements in technology have made these systems more efficient, even during cloudy days. The satisfaction of seeing my home partially powered by sunlight, a free and abundant resource, is incomparable.

One challenge I faced, however, was the upfront cost of installation. While government subsidies and incentives helped to ease this burden, it is still a significant investment that may deter some people from adopting solar energy. 30. Hence, most solar companies which I surveyed had required me to send details of my type of home with a note that it could not yet serve apartments or flats.

Large-scale solar farms also play a crucial role in Malaysia's solar energy journey. These farms contribute significantly to the national electricity supply, reducing the reliance on coal and natural gas. 31. Some crops like rooted vegetables and herbs can actually be planted in these solar farms too, maximising land use.

Solar energy in Malaysia holds great promise. 32. Although challenges remain, such as high initial costs and limited public awareness, Malaysia is moving steadily towards a greener future. My personal experience has been positive, and I hope more Malaysians will embrace this clean energy source for the benefit of both our planet and future generations.
