OBLIGATION, PERMISSION AND PROHIBITION

Function	Modal Verb	Meaning	Example
Obligation	must / have to	Strictly necessary. A rule.	You must arrive on time.
Prohibition	mustn't / can't	Prohibited. Against the rules.	You mustn't run in the hospital.
Permission	can	You have permission. It is allowed.	You can use a dictionary.
No obligation	don't have to	Not necessary. Optional.	You don't have to wear a tie.

Teacher Instructions

Title: Obligation, Permission, and Prohibition

Activity Type: Digital interactive worksheet (LiveWorksheets), multiple-choice selection, syntax/word order practice, and a sentence rewriting task (Writing).

Language Focus: Modal verbs of obligation, permission, and prohibition (must, mustn't, have to, don't have to, can, can't).

Aim: Students will be able to distinguish between different degrees of obligation, permission, and prohibition. They will demonstrate their understanding by selecting appropriate modals, structuring sentences correctly, and accurately rewriting formal rules into conversational modal structures.

Preparation: Devices with internet access for students to complete the LiveWorksheets activity.

Level: B1.

Time: 45 – 60 minutes.

Introduction: This material contextualizes modal verbs through everyday rules and regulations. It is designed to build student confidence by starting with recognition, moving to syntax structure, and finally challenging them with a transformative writing exercise.

Procedure:

1. Warm-up (5 mins): Ask students to name one rule of the classroom and one thing they are allowed to do. Introduce the concepts of obligation, prohibition, and permission.
2. Theory Review (10 mins): Review the "Grammar Notes" table with the class. Pay special attention to the difference between mustn't (prohibition) and don't have to (lack of obligation), as this is a common area of confusion for B1 students.
3. Controlled Practice (10 mins): Have students complete Exercise 1 (Multiple Choice) to test their basic comprehension of the modals in context.
4. Syntax Practice (10 mins): Guide students to Exercise 2 (Word Order). Remind them of the basic English sentence structure for modals: Subject + Modal Verb + Main Verb (base form) + Complement.
5. Productive Skill – Writing (15 mins): Explain the instructions for Exercise 3 carefully. Students must read a formal situation and rewrite it using the correct modal verb. Encourage them to refer back to the Grammar Notes if they feel stuck.
6. Submission & Feedback (10 mins): Once students submit their work on the platform, ask volunteers to read their rewritten rules from Exercise 3 aloud. Provide immediate class correction and feedback.
