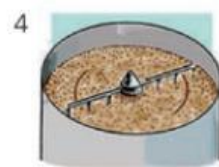

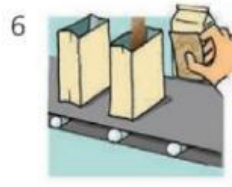

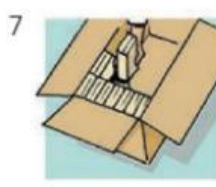

3 Read the model essay and answer the questions below.

The diagram shows information about the process of growing coffee and the steps involved in making a cup of coffee. There are 12 stages in the process, starting with picking coffee beans and finishing with drinking a cup of coffee.

In the first stage, coffee beans are picked from the trees and put into a basket. Once the coffee beans have been cleaned in a machine, they are dried in the sun. Having been dried, the beans are then roasted and ground. Subsequently, the ground coffee is put into packets and

labelled. Finally, the packets of coffee are packed into boxes, and then they are delivered to supermarkets.

If we look at the process of making a cup of coffee, to begin with coffee is bought by customers from supermarkets, after which it is taken home. After the coffee pot has been filled with water, coffee is added into the top part, and then the coffee pot is heated. When the coffee is ready, it is poured into a cup. The final stage is that the coffee can be drunk and enjoyed. This completes the process of making a cup of coffee.

Grammar: Present simple passive

To form the present simple passive:

object of the sentence + *is/are* + *past participle of the verb*

*The boxes of coffee **are delivered** to supermarkets.*

*The coffee pot **is heated**.*

If you think it's necessary to mention the person/agent who does the action, you can add *by* + person/agent at the end of the sentence:

*The boxes of coffee are bought and taken home **by customers**.*

Grammar: Present perfect passive and participle structures

You can use the present perfect passive to write about two stages of a process together:

*Once the coffee beans **have been cleaned** in a machine, they are dried in the sun.*

You use *Once/When/After* + present perfect passive in the first part of the sentence. The second half of the sentence uses the present simple passive.

You can also link two stages together by replacing the present simple passive with one of these participle structures:

Having been + past participle + subject + second part of the sentence

After being + past participle + subject + second part of the sentence

The coffee beans are cleaned in a machine, and then they are dried in the sun. →

***Having been cleaned** in a machine, the coffee beans are then dried in the sun.*

***After being cleaned** in a machine, the coffee beans are then dried in the sun.*

Note: You can only use these structures if the subject (here, *coffee beans*) is the same in both parts of the sentence.
