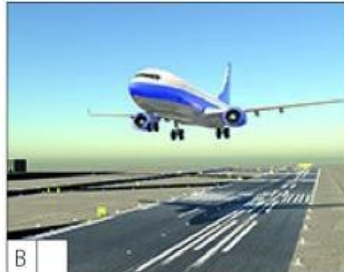

Three people talk about their choice of career



A Samir

There is a river in the town where I spent my childhood, and I remember playing there a lot when I was very young. That all stopped when I was around eleven or twelve years of age because according to most adults I knew, it was no longer safe to swim in. It was only much later that I understood the cause of their concern. It was pollution being carried from upstream – something I only understood after watching news reports of how so many rivers in my country were being negatively impacted by waste from factories and homes. After I'd made the connection in my mind, I challenged myself to do something about it. That's why I eventually went on to study environmental sciences at college and am now at the early stages of a career as a water quality technician. I am fully aware that the scale of solving this particular problem is massive and change won't happen overnight. I must admit that this frustrates me sometimes, and I'm sure other people are upset, too. Nevertheless, I'm glad that I've made this choice and hope to make a difference later in my career, even if it's a small contribution.



B Emi

I was fascinated by building things when I was a kid. I had those little blocks that you can put together to create pretty much anything you want – houses, bridges, space rockets; you name it. One thing led to another and before I knew it, I was doing things like taking clocks and bikes apart and putting them together again to find out how they were constructed! I loved nothing more than taking my time to really figure out how things operated. I'm sure you can imagine my family's response when it looked as if I'd deliberately broken something of theirs! I decided to study engineering at college. It seemed the most obvious choice. My main challenge so far has been mastering all the software that the engineering industry probably regards as standard, which I'm guessing is used in many types of engineering jobs. Compared to my peers in my course, it has taken me time to become fully comfortable in using it all. I expect it's probably going to be beneficial, though. I'm unlikely to progress far in my career if I can't use what other people might see as the essential tools of the job.



C Jon

Since I was young, I've always been fascinated by computer games, especially story-rich ones where players take on various roles and go on a journey of some kind. An ancient hidden city

There are many ancient cities around the world. In places such as Athens, Rome or Mexico City, it's possible to see the remains of sites constructed hundreds or even thousands of years ago, still standing alongside modern buildings. One chance finding a few decades ago, however, suggests there could be much more to discover, if only we knew where to direct our attention.

The town of Derinkuyu is in central Türkiye. In 1963, a local man was making repairs to his basement when he noticed that several of his chickens seemed to be disappearing through a small hole in a wall. [1] It was the entrance to a tunnel that seemed to lead deep under the surface.

Soon after, work began to learn what the tunnel was. [2] Experts began to realize that what had been found, with its total size of 445 km², was one of the world's largest underground cities.

The network consists not only of tunnels, but several large rooms. Some seem to have been used as living spaces, meeting halls and schools. [3] These were deliberately placed near the surface so that the living creatures provided a warm layer of heat. All this was additionally supported by a brilliant system of small holes that allowed fresh air to move freely from the surface right down to the deepest levels. Fresh drinking water was supplied by a well, which had been dug over 50 metres into the ground.

In all, the city could have supported as many as 20,000 inhabitants. [4] Experts have claimed that this continued for thousands of years, until as recently as the early 20th century.

There is some debate as to who created the city and why. [5] These objects, which could only be moved from the inside, can be found on each of the 18 levels of the underground city. They would have provided extra protection against invaders that might have attacked the population above ground, making sure that no enemy army could have reached the people hiding deep below.

Derinkuyu's underground city is just one of many that are now known to exist in the area. [6] At least one has recently been identified as being even larger than the one at Derinkuyu. Perhaps even more amazingly, many of these cities are interconnected by tunnels, some of which stretch for up to nine kilometres. This means that a whole civilization sought protection under the ground here, and did so very successfully, for several centuries.

Urban heat islands *by June Sire*

Many of us who live in cities experience something known as the urban heat island effect. This is a situation in which temperatures are far higher in a city than surrounding rural areas. In a growing number of places, extreme heat has become an accepted fact of life, placing elderly people in particular danger. Indeed, health warnings in cities are becoming increasingly frequent. Two out of three of us will be living in urban environments by 2050, according to the United Nations. So, urban heat islands would become an even greater issue if those in charge of designing cities did not urgently take on the problem.

The main causes of urban heat islands are the ways in which cities have been designed. Unlike trees or grass, which cities often lack, concrete absorbs and stores heat, slowly releasing it back into the atmosphere after the sun sets, a time when air would normally cool down significantly. Modern machines such as air conditioning, which do a good job of keeping the inside of buildings cool, can nevertheless worsen the situation, transferring heat into the outside environment.

So, what solutions can urban planners put into action? Clearly, we cannot simply replace our cities with ones more capable of standing up to our planet's warming climate. However, it might be possible to **retrofit** them. If we cannot make new city-centre parks, for instance, we could try adding rooftop gardens. Even painting buildings or roads white, to reflect the sun, can have a positive effect.

Alternatively, we could reverse what some might call bad decision-making. In the Korean capital of Seoul, the Cheonggyecheon river was covered by a motorway in the 1960s. Recently, it has been removed, exposing the river once again. This has created a wide area in the city where the air flows and nature has returned. Temperatures are now approximately 4°C cooler than surrounding streets. No doubt, property prices around the river have also received an economic boost. Something like this may not be possible in other cities, however, it could provide an example of an inventive solution to a growing problem.
