At first, they allowed street vendors to sell popcorn inside the theatre lobby for a small fee. Later, the owners bought their own machines and started selling popcorn themselves. This decision actually saved many cinemas from going broke during the hard economic times.

Today, the cinema industry is very different. Ticket sales are not enough to pay for all the theatre costs. In fact, cinemas make most of their profits from selling popcorn, candy, and soft drinks.
