☐	A	Student B: I agree. Students can also learn to depend on one another. What do you think about sports?
☐	B	Student A: I agree. Group projects are practical and can be done regularly. So, our final choice is group projects.
☐	C	Student B: That's true. Camps can also build teamwork because students take part in challenging activities together.
☐	D	Student B: I would choose group projects because all students can take part during lessons.
☐	E	Student A: So, which is the best way?
☐	F	Student A: Yes, especially activities like cooking, hiking or putting up a tent. How about clubs?
☐	G	Student B: I agree. It also teaches them to care about other people. Finally, schools can teach teamwork skills directly, such as listening and sharing responsibilities.
☐	H	Student A: Let's talk about projects first. I think group projects encourage teamwork because everyone must share ideas and complete different tasks.
☐	I	Student A: Good point. Community service can also encourage teamwork. For example, students can clean a park or collect donations together.
☐	J	Student A: Sports are useful too. Players must communicate and work together to win a match.
☐	K	Student B: Clubs are a good choice because members organise activities together. However, not every student is active in a club.

☐	B	Student B: True. They can write their expenses in a small notebook instead. What about avoiding impulse buying?
☐	C	Student A: That is useful, but some students may not want to use an app every day.
☐	D	Student B: We can also keep our money in a savings account, so we will not spend it easily.
☐	E	Student A: I agree. A budget also tells us how much we can save. Therefore, our final choice is making a budget.
☐	F	Student A: It is very important. We should wait for a day before buying something. This gives us time to decide whether we really need it.
☐	G	Student B: I think making a budget is the best because it helps us control all our spending.
☐	H	Student B: I agree. We should also prioritise our needs. We must buy important things before buying things we only want.
☐	I	Student A: Shall we start with making a budget? I think it is helpful because we can plan how much to spend.
☐	J	Student B: Yes. However, students may forget to save. Maybe they can use an app to track their spending.
