# Answers

## Invitation 1

### **Problem: Missing essential information**

Guests don't know:

- when
- where
- what time

Without this information, they cannot decide whether they can attend.

## Invitation 2

### **Problem: Too much unnecessary information**

An invitation should answer the guest's questions—not tell the whole story.

Keep your invitation clear and concise.

## Invitation 3

### **Problem: The tone doesn't match the occasion**

A wedding is usually a formal or semi-formal event.

The greeting and closing should reflect that.

## Invitation 4

### **Problem: No RSVP**

If the host needs to know how many people are coming, they should include an RSVP request.
