

like / love / hate + -ing

Use the -ing form after like / love / hate.

+

I / You / We / They → like making pizzas.

He / She / It → likes making pizzas.

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I / You / We / They → don't like eating vegetables.

He / She / It → doesn't like eating vegetables.

?

Short answers

Do you like drinking coffee?

Yes, I do.

No, I don't.

Does she like drinking coffee?

Yes, she does. No, she don't.

What do you like eating for breakfast? → I like eating cereal.

would like vs would like to



would like + noun
(I'd like + something)

Examples:

- I'd like a cup of tea, please.
- I'd like some ice-cream.
- She'd like a new phone.



Short note: used when you want an object / thing



would like to + verb
(I'd like to + do something)

Examples:

- I'd like to go to the cinema tonight.
- He'd like to travel to Spain.
- We'd like to order now.



Short note: used when you want to do an action



'd like refers to now or the near future.
