

Expressing obligation and prohibition

Have to / Must + infinitive

= Muset

They are normally used to talk about obligation (povinnost) or something that it is necessary to do.

They have very similar meaning. **Have to** is more common for general, external obligations (rules, laws) and **must** is more common for specific or personal obligations. Compare:

- *I have to wear a shirt and tie to work.* = It's a rule in this company.
- *I must buy a new shirt.* = It's my own decision.

Have to exists in all tenses (present, past, future) and forms (gerund, infinitive)

- *I have to do it. / I had to do it. / I will have to do it.*

Must exists only in present tense.

- *I must do it.*

Don't have to + infinitive

= Nemuset

- *I don't have to pay for the tickets.* - It's not necessary.
- *I didn't have to go to school last week.*
- *I will have to study more.*

don't have to
Not Necessary



Mustn't + infinitive

= Nesmět

- *You mustn't park here.* - It's prohibited.

We can often use **can't** (=nemoc) or **not be allowed to** instead of mustn't

- *You can't park here.*
- *You are not allowed to park here.*

mustn't
Prohibited



Should/Shouldn't + infinitive

= Měl bys / Neměl bys

We use it to give advice or an opinion. It is not as strong as must/have to.

- *You should take warm clothes with you to Dublin. It might be cold there.*
- *You shouldn't drink so much coffee. It's not good for you.*
- *Should I do it or not?*



We can use **ought to/ought not to + infinitive** instead of should/shouldn't.

- *You ought to take warm clothes.*
- *You ought not to drink so much coffee.*
