

Countable and Uncountable Nouns

	Rules	Example
Countable Nouns (How many?)	Singular: Use "a / an"	<u>a</u> book → two books <u></u>
	Plural: Add "-s / -es"	<u>an</u> ostrich → three ostrich <u>es</u>
Uncountable Nouns (How much?)	Use "some"	water → some water
	Use " <u>Quantifiers</u> "	tea → two <u>cups</u> of tea • a <u>glass</u> of water / juice / milk • a <u>cup</u> of tea / coffee • a <u>bowl</u> of rice / soup • a <u>slice</u> of bread / pizza / cheese • a <u>piece</u> of paper / cake
