

COMPARATIVES WITH AS ... AS

A Weekend Trip

Last month, Daniel and his sister went on a weekend trip to a small town in the mountains. The town was **as beautiful as** they had expected, and the weather was **as pleasant as** it had been in the city.

Daniel usually drives **as carefully as his sister**, but on the mountain roads, she drove **as slowly as possible**. They didn't travel **as quickly as they normally do** because some of the roads were narrow.

The hotel was comfortable, although it wasn't **as modern as** their hotel in the city. However, the rooms were **as clean as** they needed to be, and the staff were very friendly.

Daniel enjoyed the trip because he could spend **as much time as** he wanted outdoors. His sister took **as many photos as possible** because she loved the scenery.

At the end of the weekend, they agreed that they had enjoyed the trip **as much as each other**. They were already thinking about visiting another mountain town soon.

GRAMMAR: AS ... AS

We use **as + adjective/adverb + as** to say that two people, things, or actions are equal or similar in some way.

1. AS + ADJECTIVE + AS

We use this structure to compare qualities.

Subject + be + as + adjective + as + noun/pronoun

- My house is as big as yours.

The adjective does not change.

✗ My house is as bigger as yours.

✓ My house is as big as yours.

Negative form: not as + adjective + as

- My car is not as expensive as yours.

2. AS + ADVERB + AS

We compare how two people perform an action.

Subject + verb + as + adverb + as + noun/pronoun

- Maria runs as quickly as her brother.

The adverb describes the action:

- She works as carefully as her mother. → adverb → describes how she works.

Negative:

- I don't drive as carefully as my father.

3. AS + VERB + AS

We can use as much as and as many as to compare the amount of an action or activity.

AS MUCH AS + uncountable noun / verb

- I don't have as much time as you.
- She doesn't drink as much coffee as her brother.

AS MANY AS + plural countable noun

- She has as many books as I do.
- We took as many photos as possible.

4. AS MUCH / AS MANY + NOUN + AS

Uncountable nouns → as much + noun + as

- I don't have as much free time as you.

Plural countable nouns → as many + noun + as

- We don't have as many employees as they do.
