A trampoline—a flexible platform on which one jumps up and down—has long been a favorite among children. However, the trampoline is now being used in a new way, as part of an extreme sport that may someday be practiced competitively.

Wall trampoline, developed in the world of the circus, requires both courage and skill. It involves the athletes, called bouncers, throwing themselves off a wall onto a trampoline almost five meters below. They then bounce off the trampoline and back to the top of the wall. As they're flying through the air, they perform jumps, loops, and other tricks in much the same way as freestyle skiers and skateboarders.

According to the developers of wall trampoline, it is more impressive than traditional trampoline because the participants do not need to do many small bounces in order to gain the height needed to perform tricks. The bouncers start from a high place, so they can fly higher from the first jump. However, the presence of the wall can make it dangerous. The bouncers always have to be very aware of where they are in relation to the wall to avoid hitting it by accident.

Inventing a new extreme sport is not completely straightforward. The rules—or lack of them—must be considered. Fans of wall trampoline enjoy the fact that it is a freestyle activity, but if bouncers want to compete against each other, a formal method to judge their moves is needed.

This passage is about education.

In 1919, Rudolf Steiner, an Austrian philosopher, was invited to give a lecture on education to workers of the Waldorf-Astoria cigarette factory in Stuttgart, Germany. The employees were so fascinated by Steiner's ideas that they asked him to establish a school for their children. This school became known as the Waldorf School, and it was the first of many.

One reason Steiner disliked the traditional school system was because it didn't allow all students to continue studying after elementary school. In contrast, his schools were open to all children for a total of 12 years. His ideas about the curriculum were also different. Steiner thought that learning should match the three stages of child development. In the first, he believed that young children should do hands-on activities in class because they learn best by imitating and doing. For example, a Waldorf student would learn to write first and then to read at the age of seven—an idea criticized by some educators. In the second stage, from ages seven to twelve, students mainly focus on visual learning, art, and languages. Later, students learn academic subjects and critical thinking skills during the third stage, when they are teenagers. Students in Waldorf schools also learn practical skills, such as knitting and woodworking.

Waldorf's ideas and schools had spread throughout Europe by 1938. Many Waldorf schools were closed during World War II, but the movement regained momentum after the war. Today, there are over 1,000 Waldorf schools across 60 countries.

3D Animation Demystified

by Nancy Davis

Computer animation is the process of creating moving images by using computer graphics. An image, shown on the computer screen, is replaced repeatedly by a new similar image that is the next in the sequence.

Three-dimensional computer animation uses two techniques: *keyframed movements* and *motion capture*. In keyframing, the animator creates a simple picture of the character's body, like a skeleton. Then the animator creates important points in the action, called *frames*, and lets the computer create the frames in between.

Motion capture uses live action. A real person professionally trained in drama performs the scene. The motion, recorded by video camera and sent to a computer, is then applied to the animated character.

The right food. It must help sustain your energy and have a nice enough flavor that you look forward to eating it. Test a few camping foods before you go to see what you like best; bring enough food and water to last through your trip.

The right sleeping gear. Bring the right sleeping bag based on the weather and a tent that's easy to set up—because you'll be tired when you get to your campground!

The right tools. Safety should be top priority. Bring maps, a compass, a communication device, and a first-aid kit.

Thirst for Adventure



Access to safe, fresh drinking water is without a doubt a key consideration for outdoor travelers. If your next journey involves climbing a mountain, hiking through a forest, or

canoeing through the rivers of a national park, don't forget to plan how to stay hydrated.

If you'll be near freshwater sources, like rivers and lakes, bring a water filter so you don't have to carry any heavy containers. Also bring iodine tablets in case your filter breaks. Placed in water and dissolved, these tablets will ensure the water is safe to drink. And finally, make sure you carry enough water with you for any portions of the trip where you won't have access. Staying hydrated is key to your safety!

D A Fine Pine Surprise



Making water safe to drink can require costly technology or chemicals. What if there was a way to provide safe drinking water using only a tree branch? Scientists have recently tested the wood of pine trees for this purpose. Specifically, they used the inside of tree branches, known as the xylem, which is tissue that distributes water throughout the tree.

Because xylem is good at removing air bubbles from

water as it transports that water from roots to leaves, scientists thought it might also be good at removing other impurities in water, like harmful bacteria. They tested this theory by fashioning a filter out of pinewood. Taking a branch and removing the bark to leave only the xylem, they then attached a tube to the bottom of the branch, and sent water down through the top. The result? Water filtered through the branch was almost entirely free from bacteria.

Of course, there remains work to be done if we are to benefit from this discovery. Even a tiny amount of bacteria left in the water could be harmful. And the filter might not work as well on water that is particularly dirty. Still, this could benefit not only campers stranded in the woods, but have an enormous global impact by providing abundant safe water to regions in need.
