THE UNIVERSE

The universe is a vast, endless space. This space contains various heavenly bodies, such as the Sun, planets, thousands and thousands of stars and the Moon.

HOW DID THE UNIVERSE BEGIN?

THE BIG BANG

1  Thousands and thousands of years ago, the universe began as a tiny hot compact point.

2 Then came a big explosion called the **Big Bang**, when the universe began to expand. Much of the universe was made of gases. Gradually, as the gases expanded, they began to cool down.



3 It took many, many years for these gases and dust to come together and form galaxies, stars, planets and more.



5 Many scientists use this theory to explain the creation of the universe. However, what caused the Big Bang in the first place remains a mystery!

4  The matter that spread out after the Big Bang slowly took shape into everything that is there in the universe today—including us!

The universe also contains dust, gases and pieces of rocks. It is bigger than anything we can ever imagine.

The Galaxies and Stars

A **star** is a ball of **hot gases** that burn all the time and glow like a big fire.

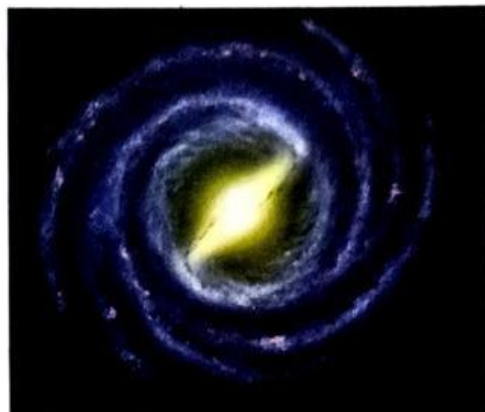
A huge collection of stars along with gases and dust is called a **galaxy**. There are many galaxies in the universe.

Have you ever looked at the stars at night? They are of different sizes.

However, all stars look very small because they are very far away from us.

Stars have their own light and heat, and they shine all the time in the sky. During the day, the light from the Sun is so bright that we are unable to see the light of other stars in the sky.

Our Earth receives heat and light from the Sun, which makes all forms of life—humans, plants and animals—possible on the Earth. Our Earth is one of the eight planets of the solar system.



The Milky Way Galaxy: Our Earth is part of this galaxy.

The Planets

The eight planets are heavenly bodies which move around the Sun on fixed paths known as orbits. All planets are of nearly the same shape but are different in size. Planets have no light or heat of their own. They shine because they reflect the light received from the Sun.

Word to Know

orbit: the path taken by an object moving around a larger object in space



THE SOLAR SYSTEM

The Sun is a star. It is the centre of the solar system. It is the closest star to the Earth. The eight planets in the order of increasing distance from the Sun are Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune.

The Sun

is a huge ball of hot glowing gases. It is the largest member of the solar system.

Mercury

is the **smallest** planet in the solar system. Since it is closest to the Sun, it is too hot to support any form of life.

Venus

is the **hottest** planet as well as the **third smallest** planet in the solar system. It is called the evening star or the morning star.

The Earth

is the **fourth smallest** planet in the solar system. It is the only planet known to support life. The Earth has both land and water. It is also surrounded by air.

Mars

is the **second smallest** planet in the solar system. Mars has surface features similar to those found on the Earth. However, Mars is much smaller than the Earth.

Saturn

is the **second largest** planet in the solar system.

Uranus

is the **third largest** planet in the solar system.

Neptune

is the **fourth largest** planet in the solar system.

Jupiter

is the **largest** planet in the solar system.

Satellites

A **satellite** is a heavenly body that **revolves** around a planet. Like planets, satellites also have no light of their own. Other than Mercury and Venus, all other planets have satellites. The Earth has only one **natural** satellite, known as the Moon.



The Moon moves around the Earth.

DID YOU KNOW? 

ZoOm In

A group of stars that forms a recognisable pattern in the sky and has been given a name by the International Astronomical Union is known as a constellation. Orion (the Hunter) and Ursa Major (the Great Bear) are two of the 88 constellations recognised by the International Astronomical Union.
