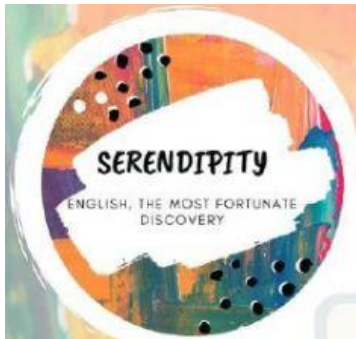
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3. Pronunciation: -ed ending

Past simple regular verbs

The e in -ed is not usually pronounced, and -ed is pronounced /d/ or /t/, e.g. closed /kləʊzd/, stopped/stɒpt/.

The -ed is pronounced /ɪd/ only in verbs which end with the sound /d/ or /t/, e.g. waited /'weɪtɪd/ ended /'endɪd/

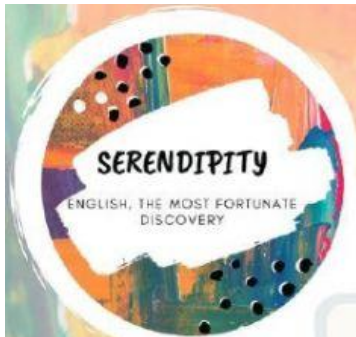

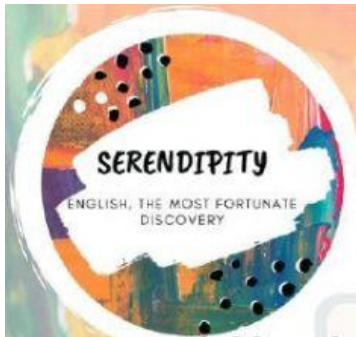

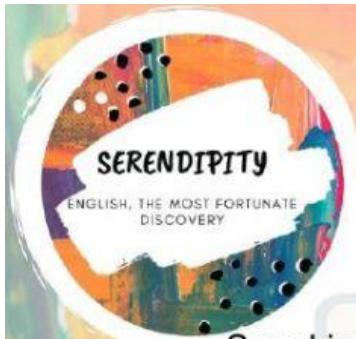
