The Stories We Tell

People love stories. We have told stories in times of confusion and destruction as well as in times of peace and prosperity. We've told them around campfires and dinner tables, in grass huts and grand opera houses. Sometimes we've told them through poetry, sometimes through song. Sometimes they are told orally, sometimes they are written down for us to read. We never run out of stories because storytellers constantly replenish our supply. They create new stories, and they make old stories seem new by telling them in new ways. We enjoy stories that make us laugh; we even enjoy stories that make us cry. Perhaps this is because sad stories are rarely told to demoralize us. Instead, they lift our spirits because they usually tell us how people persevere in times of extremity such as war and natural disasters. Stories serve many functions. They entertain us by stirring our emotions and moving us to action. They tell us about our culture.

Each culture learns about itself through its stories and uses them to spread knowledge among all the members of the culture. Even the silliest television comedy tells us something about our culture – what we value and how we live our lives. Our stories manifest what we believe about our world; they reveal who we are. Some people, for example, believe that to destroy the stories of their culture would completely eradicate the culture itself.

It makes sense then to study the stories of peoples we want to understand. Scholars have long known that a culture's literature is an important part of the historical record of what people believe about themselves.

We may prefer one story one day and another story a different day, depending on our mood, but one thing is certain. Stories will never go out of style.
