

Non-defining relative clauses

We use non-defining relative clause when we want to add extra information to a sentence.
We use commas to show that the extra information is extra.

My friend Lisa is 12 years old. She lives in Australia.

My friend Lisa, who lives in Australia, is 12 years old.

I visited Madrid last month. It is the capital of Spain.

I visited Madrid, which is the capital of Spain, last month.
