

Past Progressive

The **past progressive** tense is used to talk about a past action that happened at the same time as another action, or was in progress at a particular time in the past. To form the past progressive tense, add the past tense of the verb *be* before the verb. Add *-ing* to the end of the base form of the verb.

past progressive

Dawn was babysitting for her little sister when I stopped by her house.

Present Progressive

The **present progressive** tense is used to talk about an action that is in progress or happening right now. To form the present progressive tense, add the present tense of the verb *be* before the verb. Add *-ing* to the end of the verb.

present progressive

Jake is looking for a new jacket.
