shopping centres

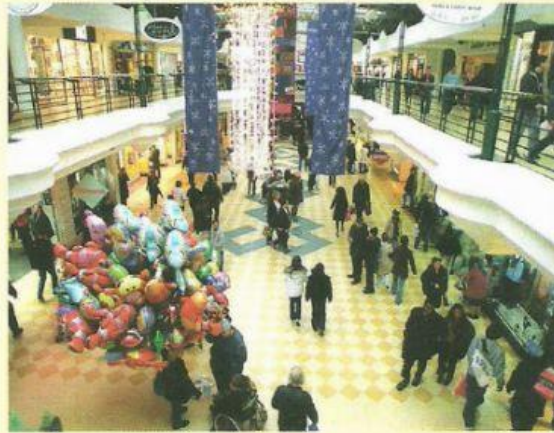
