MUST	HAVE TO
OBLIGATION Expresses obligation from the speaker onto the listener. The speaker thinks it is necessary.	OBLIGATION Expresses obligation from the speaker on him/herself. Another person thinks it's necessary.
PAST	
MUSTN'T	NOT HAVE TO
PROHIBITION Expresses that something is forbidden, not allowed. You mustn't use the mobile in class.	OBLIGATION Expresses free will. The person chooses to do or not to do. You don't have to call your parents. I can drop you home.
