



USE OF MUST / HAVE TO

MUST

OBLIGATION

Expresses obligation from the speaker onto the listener.
The speaker thinks it is necessary.

HAVE TO

OBLIGATION

Expresses obligation from the speaker on him/herself.
Another person thinks it's necessary.

PAST

MUSTN'T

PROHIBITION

Expresses that something is forbidden, not allowed.
You mustn't use the mobile in class.

NOT HAVE TO

OBLIGATION

Expresses free will. The person chooses to do or not to do.
You don't have to call your parents. I can drop you home.
