Aaron Sanders Jr. is an administrator at Newton North High School, and he has known many of the Newton North students for years. Recently, he has been working with class leadership officers to put together fun events. His hope is that students have a sense of normalcy.

"We meet to talk about different activities to keep the class united," Sanders said.

Kevin Wu is the student body president. He and other student leaders have worked to put on safe events that could keep the senior class connected. They hosted a free movie night and a kickball tournament.



Wu said the student council used to focus on raising funds, but that has changed since the COVID-19 pandemic.

"There's really been a shift to run events that bring people together rather than just focused on what's financially best," Wu said.

## **Outside Prom Planned**

Newton North is going to have an outdoor, in-person prom for the class of 2021. The celebration will take place on a field with COVID-19 safety rules.

Some students said this prom is not what they expected, but they're grateful.

"I think to some extent we all didn't think we were going to have a prom; then when we found out we would, it was a pleasant surprise," said Sara Sales, a senior. "I think everyone's pretty happy just to have the opportunity to be able to participate in an event like that, and bring everyone together."

Ellie Solomon, another senior, said she is excited. She is eager to dress up, take pictures and connect with friends, especially because the school did not have a prom in 2020. The spread of the coronavirus led to many event cancellations, and classes were often held online.

Sanders said the class of 2021 has done well adapting to the current climate. Even though this is not what they expected back in freshman year, "the students have persevered," Sanders said. "We're doing the best we can and we look forward to celebrating what we can celebrate at the end of the year and enjoying every minute of it."

## "We've Gone Through A Crazy Year"

Graduation and prom symbolize an end for seniors, but Sales thinks her class is ready.

"I feel like everyone's just ready to graduate to some extent," Sales said. "We've gone through a crazy year, and I think we're all sort of ready to just move on and go to college at this point."

Sanders and Wu said students of the class of 2021 should be proud of what they have gone through.
