

Does it have a prefix or a suffix?

Prefixes and suffixes can help you understand a word. They give you important information about the word.

Some prefixes give adjectives the **opposite** meaning:

- un-** happy - unhappy
- im-** possible - impossible
- dis-** satisfied - dissatisfied
- ir-** regular - irregular
- il-** legal - illegal

Other prefixes make a word **negative**:

- anti-** social - antisocial
- non-** profit - non-profit

Suffixes can tell you what type of word it is, e.g. nouns often end in **-ment** (enjoyment), **-ness** (happiness) or **-ion** (education). Here are some common suffixes for nouns.

- ment** - management / arrangement
- ism** - racism / communism
- ness** - happiness / sadness
- ship** - friendship / relationship
- er/-or** - director / teacher
- tion** - communication / education

Common suffixes for verbs:

- ate** - create / activate
- ify** - verify / solidify
- ise/-ize** - authorise / categorise

Common suffixes for adjectives:

- able** - reliable / capable
- al** - accidental / universal
- ful** - helpful / wonderful
- ous/-ious** - dangerous / nervous / religious
- ive** - creative / sensitive
