



The Myth of Perseus and Medusa

Do you know about Pegasus, the famous Greek horse *with* wings? Do you know how Pegasus was created? His story is linked to the myth of Perseus and Medusa.

Perseus was the son of princess Danae of Argos and Zeus, the god of the sky and ruler of all the Olympian gods. Perseus was given an important mission *on* a bright Sunday morning: he had to kill Medusa. If you looked at her, you turned *into* stone. Perseus had to kill her *without* looking at her. He could kill her *with* the right weapons. He got a mirrored shield, winged sandals, a powerful sword, and an invisibility helmet from the gods. He left *at* noon *on* the following day. He flew to the end of the world *with* the winged sandals. He saw a hidden cave *between* two mountains. He found Medusa *in* this cave. She could not see him, because he was protected *by* the invisibility helmet. He saw her reflection *on* the mirrored shield, and he cut off her head *with* his mighty sword. Pegasus was born from the blood of Medusa *after* her death. Perseus found him *at* the entrance of the cave. Pegasus and Perseus flew back to Greece, and Perseus became a famous hero. He was given a medal *at* sunset. There was a huge celebration *in* the king's palace. Perseus killed Medusa *by* using his intelligence and powerful weapons. He could not have accomplished this important mission *without* the special weapons of the gods.
