Too

We use **too + adjective** to say that something is excessive. It means more than you need or want. It has a negative meaning.

This Harry Potter book is **too expensive**.
I can't afford it.

Not ... enough

We use **not + adjective + enough** to say that something is 'less than you need or want'. It has a negative meaning.

The comedian was **not funny enough**.

(not) as...as

We use **(not) as + adjective + as** to compare two people or things.

Rupert Grint is **not as famous as** Daniel Radcliffe.
