REMEMBER

They **have gone to** the cinema.

(This means that they haven't come back yet. They are still at the cinema.)

~~I have gone to...~~ / ~~We have gone to...~~ not possible.

Tom **has been to** London.

(This means that he has visited London: he is not there now. He has come back.)

Been in

She's gone there (not to there)

I've been to the supermarket.

I ve been there (not to there)

I've been in Paris for two days.

I ve been here for two days. ((not in here))
