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
- What family does the instrument you have listened to belong to? (X).

The instrumental theme is repeated.


The voice concludes the work, with a short a cappella phrase.

Look at the two images below corresponding to the images found on two Greek vessels.


What instruments are the musicians playing? Join with arrows.


