



When the sentence is positive, the tag is negative

You are tired, aren't you?

He drank all the milk, didn't he?

When the sentence is negative, the tag is positive

You aren't a doctor, are you?

You haven't seen Peter lately, have you?



When the sentence contains a word with a negative meaning like **nobody, never, hardly, seldom, or rarely**, the question tag is positive.

She hardly goes anywhere, does she?

They never called you back, did they?

Some verbs/ expressions form question tags differently. STUDY THE FOLLOWING EXAMPLES.



I am → aren't I?

Imperative → will/won't you?

I'm tall, aren't I?

Stop talking, will you?

Clean your bedroom, won't you?

Don't → will you?

Let's → shall we?

Don't move, will you?

Let's sit here, shall we?



I have (got) → haven't I?

(= I possess)

I have → don't I?

He has got a brand-new car, hasn't he?

You have lunch with my granny, don't you?

There is/are → isn't/aren't there?

That/ This is → isn't it?

There is a spider in the bathroom, isn't there?

That's Tom's coat, isn't it?



When the subject is nothing, we use **it** in the tag question

Nothing strange happened at the party, did it?

When the subject is **nobody, somebody, everybody, no one, someone, or everyone**, we use **they** in the tag question

Nobody called me, did they?
