Focus on Grammar | Modal Verbs **must** / **mustn't**, **have to** / **don't have to**

Which of these sentences expresses obligation?

- You don't have to attend this meeting.
- You must attend this meeting.
- You should attend this meeting.

We can use **must** to express strong recommendation, obligation or certainty.

We can use **must not** or **mustn't** to express prohibition.

Example: You must speak to her, but you mustn't shout.

We can use **have to** to express certainty, necessity and obligation.

We can use **don't have to** to suggest that someone is not required to do something.

Example: You have to arrive on time but you don't have to be here all day.

Note this!

Have got to is used to express necessity or obligation.

Example: You've got to tell him the truth.

Gotta is a contraction of have got to and is used in informal speech.

Example: I gotta learn this for my exam.

Do not pronounce the first **t** in **mustn't**!
