

Sights in London

If you go to London, I am sure you will want to see all of the famous sights:



- Big Ben, the clock tower which is a cultural icon of the United Kingdom,

- Tower Bridge, which allows 40,000 people to cross the River Thames every day,



- The London Eye, Europe's tallest Ferris wheel and the highest public viewing point in London,

- The Tower of London, Her Majesty's Royal Palace and Fortress, which houses all the royal regalia,

But how about seeing some other places too? Here are three amazing places you should see on your visit to London.



1. Churchill War Rooms

Do you want to know where the leaders of Britain worked during the Second World War? No, they didn't work in the Parliament every day – they controlled the situation in and outside the country from this underground centre located not far from the Parliament. The Churchill War Rooms were built just before the war started in 1939, so the government and Chiefs of the armed forces could use the underground headquarters immediately. There, they had huge maps (in the Map Room) on which they marked where fighting took place. Winston Churchill made his strategic decisions from that room, and he sometimes slept there too. However, as soon as the war ended in 1945, The Churchill War Rooms were closed and haven't been used by the government since then. The Rooms were open to the public in 1984. Later, they were redecorated, expanded and re-opened to visitors again in 2003.

2. Thorpe Park
