



ORDINAL NUMBERS

We normally add a TH to the end of a cardinal number to make it an ordinal number. Be careful of the spelling exceptions below:

Prepositions with years, months, and dates


Use in + years, e.g. The Rio Olympics are in 2016. Use in + months, e.g. My birthday's in February. Use on + dates, e.g. The meeting is on Friday 5th September.

Saying years

1807 eighteen oh seven 1936 nineteen thirty-six

2008 two thousand and eight (for years 2000–2010) 2011 two thousand and eleven OR twenty eleven





	Present simple	Present Continuous	
Form	It always <i>rains.</i> My sister works in a bank. What do you usually wear to work?	Look, it's <i>raining</i> ! Today she's working at home. What are you wearing now?	
Use	We use the present simple to say what we usually do, or things that are normally true.	We use the present continuous to say what is happening now.	
	We use the present simple with adverbs and expressions of frequency, e.g. always, often, once a week, etc.	We use the present continuous with at the moment, now, today, this week, etc.
