3- There are some amazing facts about films that sometimes we don't know. I want to share with you a text with fascinating facts about film extras.

FASCINATING FACTS about film extras

Producer Mario Cecchi employed a very large number of **actors** for his 125th film, *The Department Store* (1986). He told everyone it was his last film and used every available actor from his previous 124 films. Some were the **stars** of the film, but most of them had **roles** as extras.

In the western *Man of Conquest* (1939) the Native American actors used sign language. The **studio** said they didn't have speaking roles so they should earn less money than the other actors. The Native Americans told the actors' union that sign language was speaking, and they wanted more money. They got it.

During the filming of *Reds* (1981), director Warren Beatty told the extras about the theories of Marxist John Read, who said that workers were badly treated in capitalist societies. The extras learnt quickly. They had a meeting and refused to work the next day because the salary was too low. Beatty agreed to pay more.

The extras in *Hell's Highway* (1932) were all ex-criminals. **Director** Fritz Lang used real criminals in his film, M (1931). Before filming finished, twenty-four were arrested for various crimes.

The largest number of extras in a film was for *Gandhi* (1982) – 300,000 for the funeral **scene**. People heard about the film through radio and newspaper advertisements, on TV and on the streets. There were 94,560 extras with a contract (they earned 40p each) and more than 200,000 volunteers. The scene was filmed on 31st January, exactly thirty-three years after Gandhi's funeral, and it took two minutes and five seconds of the film.
