

QUANTIFIERS

When do we use: **a little / a few?**

a little: **uncountable nouns.**

a few: **countable nouns.**

Examples:

- He has a little money left.
- He has a few dollars left.

When do we use: **much / many?**

Much: **uncountable nouns.**

Many: **countable nouns.**

Examples:

- How much money have you got?
- How many dollars have you got?

When do we use: **Some / Any?**

Some: Affirmative sentences. Countable and uncountable nouns.

Any: Questions and negative sentences. Countable and uncountable nouns.

Examples: - There's some cheese.

- There aren't any cheese.
