Read this text about school education in the UK and complete the summary below.

In the UK education is compulsory from the age of 5 to 16. Children attend Primary School from age 5 to 11. The first year is called Reception, followed by Key Stage 1, known also as Infant School, and Key Stage 2, called Junior School. Pupils begin their Secondary Education at 11. At the age of 16 students in England, Wales and Northern Ireland take an examination called the GCSE (General Certificate of Secondary Education). In Scotland the equivalent of the GCSE is the Scottish Certificate of Education (SCE). After completing the GCSE some students leave school, others take technical qualifications, while others continue for two more years at the 6th Form Secondary School or College. Here they take other exams known as A levels in 3 or 4 subjects to enter university. Students may attend either a state school, which is a government-run school or a public school which charges fees.
