

# Object Questions

**Q**uestion word  
**A**uxiliary verb  
**S**ubject  
**M**ain verb

**Object questions** are sometimes called “wh-questions” or “five w” questions” because they begin with one of five “wh” words: “who,” “what,” “when,” “where” and “why.” They can also begin with “how,” “how much” or “how many.”

There is a simple, dependable **pattern** to remember when forming object questions. It is called **QUASM** and it works for most verb tenses.

Object Question Examples				
Question Word	Auxiliary Verb	Subject	Main Verb	
What	do	Americans	eat	for breakfast?
How	did	you	make	that dish?
How many cards	do	I	have	in my hand?
Where	are	you	going	for Thanksgiving?
How	can	we	improve	our customer service?
