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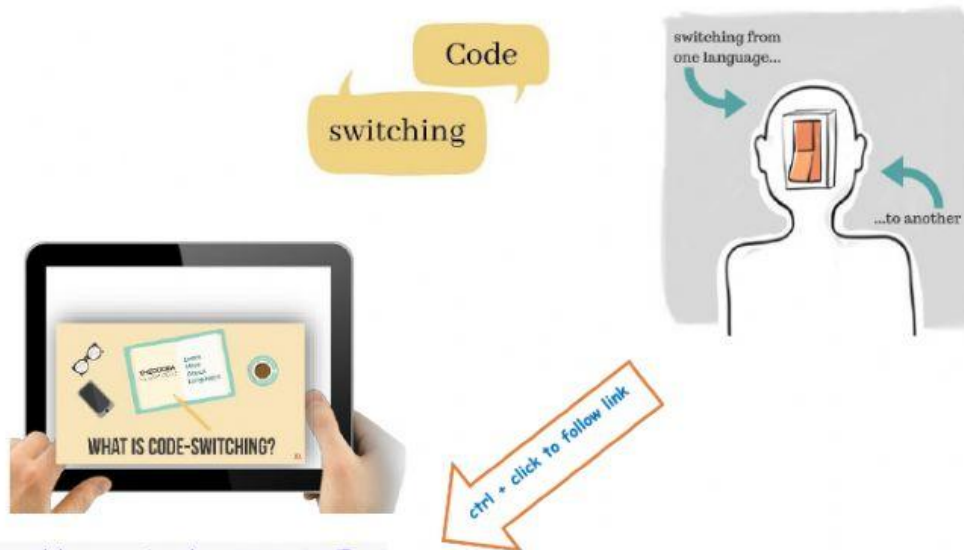
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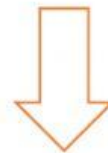

### Definition 1

Hymes (1971) defines code switching as "a common term for alternative use of two or more languages, varieties of a language or even speech styles."

### Definition 2

According to Myers-Scotton (1993:47) code switching refers to the "use of two or more languages in the same conversation." Code switching is the shifting by a speaker from language A to language B.

### Definition 3

Auer (1998) "alternating use of two or more codes within one conversational episode". In this case, "codes" refer to distinct language varieties or dialect.



### Definition 4

Van der Walt (2001) Code switching is a natural phenomenon in bilingual and multilingual communities. It is a sign of the dynamic nature of language and the way in which people make language to serve their needs. Code switching shows a high degree of cognitive and effective control over the grammatical, syntactic and semantic

elements of various languages simultaneously, specifically in inter-sentential code switching.



### Definition 5

Bokamba (1989:278) "Code switching is the mixing of words, phrases and sentences from distinct grammatical (sub) systems across sentence boundaries within the same speech event...code mixing is the embedding of various linguistic units such as affixes (bound morphemes), words (unbound morphemes), phrases and clauses from cooperative activity where the participants, in order to infer what is intended, must reconcile what they hear with what they understand.
