

Wish + Past Verb (Verb 2)

In English, we use **wish + past form verb** when we want something now or in the future to be different.

e.g. I wish I **had** more money. (Now you have a little money.)

I wish I **didn't have to** do the housework every day. (You have to do it everyday now.)
