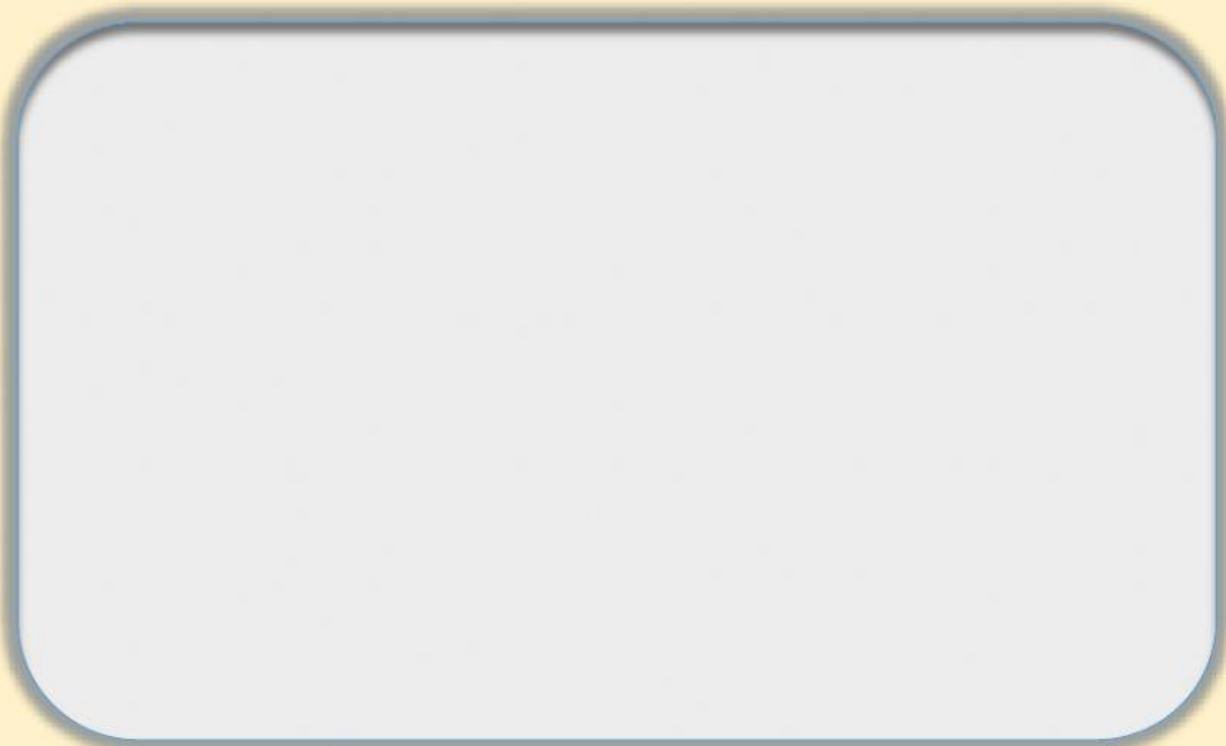


Present Perfect – Just/Already/Yet



JUST / ALREADY / YET

just



already



yet



- We use **just** when an action happened recently

I have **just** eaten breakfast

- We use **already** when an action happened sooner than expected

I have **already** finished page 20

- We use **yet** when we think an action will happen soon

I haven't eaten lunch **yet**

JUST
ALREADY
YET



EXAMPLES:

DONE



I've already cleaned my room

She has already sent the mail

PLAN
TO DO



I haven't cleaned my room yet.

She hasn't sent the mail yet.

Have you finished your work yet?.

RECENTLY
DONE



I've just cleaned my room.

She has just sent the mail.
