

ALL, MOST – QUANTIFIERS	
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ALL	ALL + noun All plants need water. (all plants in general)
	ALL (OF) THIS + noun All (of) the plants in the garden died. (these plants in particular)
	ALL OF + object pronoun All of them were at the party.
	ALL in mid position We all went to the event. They were all happy.
	ALL + relative clause We visited all the cities. Susan slept all morning.
MOST	EVERYTHING EVERYBODY ALL + verb Everything is big in the US. (NOT All is big) Everybody was there. (NOT All were there)
	MOST + noun Most students think university should be free. (Most students in general)
	MOST OF THIS + noun Most of the students in my class are French. (these students in particular)
MOST	MOST OF + object pronoun Most of them are French.
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BOTH, EITHER, NEITHER	
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BOTH	BOTH + AND + noun Both Jane and Margaret passed the exam.
	BOTH (OF THE) + noun Both (of the) students passed the exam.
	BOTH OF + object pronoun Both of them passed the exam.
	BOTH in mid position They both passed it. They were both happy.
EITHER	EITHER + OR + noun Either Sue or her sister has been here.
	EITHER + singular noun You can fish from either side of the river.
	EITHER OF THIS + plural noun Either of the cars is a good purchase.
	EITHER OF + object pronoun Choose one of the cars. Either of them is OK.
NEITHER	NEITHER + OR + noun Neither Sue nor her sister has been here.
	NEITHER + singular noun Neither candidate is a good option.
	NEITHER OF THIS + plural noun Neither of the candidates is a good option.
	NEITHER OF + object pronoun I like neither of them.
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ANY, NO, NONE – QUANTIFIERS	
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ANY	ANY (more) I don't have any friends. Is there any milk? No, there isn't any.
	ANYTHING ANYBODY ANYWHERE I don't have anybody to ask for help. We didn't go anywhere.
	In positive sentences, not important which You can come any weekend. Any idiot would know how to use this phone.
	IN NEGATIVES & QUESTIONS
NO	NO + noun I have no friends. We use no fertilizer.
	NOTHING NOBODY NOWHERE I have nobody to help me. We went nowhere.
	NO + verb "How many friends do you have?" "None."
	NO + noun I thought I had some money but I have none.
NONE	NONE + noun None of the children is from France.
	NONE OF + object pronoun None of them is from France.
