

'IN CASE' or 'IF'



A BIT OF THEORY...

Interestingly, students of all levels, even upper-intermediate ones, occasionally make errors when they have to choose between the conjunctions 'if' and 'in case' in complex sentences. Though there are sentences where they are interchangeable, in many cases only one of them makes the sentence grammatically correct. How to differentiate between them? There are a few 'rules of thumb' to keep in mind:

- 'if' is a conditional conjunction and has the meaning of 'on condition that' when used in conditional sentences.
e.g. You'll get wet if it rains. (=On condition that it starts raining, you'll get wet).
e.g. I usually take a pill if I have a stomachache. (=On condition that my stomach starts aching, I take a pill)
In other words, the action will not happen unless the 'if'-clause happens.
- 'in case' is often used in the meaning of precaution and is close to 'just in case'. The action in the main clause can happen to prevent a bad scenario in the 'in case'-clause.
e.g. Take an umbrella in case it rains. (=Just in case it starts raining, take an umbrella!)
- e.g. I've bought some more cheese in case we need more. (=Just in case we might want to eat some more cheese, I've bought more).
- Very often, 'if' can be instead of 'in case' and vice versa depending on what we want to express - conditionality or precaution.
