People play it at the White House every Easter. It is a race, where children push an egg through the grass with a long-handled spoon. The winner is the egg which rolls the furthest without cracking.

According to the ancient island's tradition, on Holy Saturday Corfu residents decorate their windows and balconies with clay pots. Then, they throw them from the balconies, smashing them into pieces on the streets below. Many people gather around to watch.

The tradition is common in several nations. The custom involves making an effigy (ομοίωμα) of Apostle Judas, who betrayed Jesus. People burn the effigy or explode it from within with fireworks.

Young children dress up as Easter witches. They put kerchiefs on their heads and paint big freckles and rosy cheeks on their faces. They go door-to-door, wishing people a happy Easter and getting sweets in return (similar to the American tradition of trick-or-treating on Halloween).

On Easter Monday, men sprinkle women with perfumed water. Of course, the water symbolizes purification, and it was believed to be beneficial for fertility in ancient times.

The **Scoppio del Carro** is a tradition of Florence. On Easter Sunday, a cart, full of fireworks and other pyrotechnics, is lit and provides a historic spectacle of the city.

People tap their eggs against the eggs of others, and the person who ends up with the last unbroken egg the luckiest. The winning egg is kept until next Easter as a sign of prosperity.
