




Look at the following image.

The minga, a solidarity way of living

What a joy! The horn has sounded. Everyone leaves the houses with big smiles on their lips. The minga is going to begin! This time it will be to help Juan's family, whose house was destroyed by a large landslide.

Juan's sister runs scared to her grandfather when she hears the great sound.

- What's wrong, grandfather? He asks.

- Do not be scared darling, it is the call to start the minga, answers the grandfather.
- What is the minga grandfather? Asks the girl.
- The minga is a party! Says the grandpa. —A party in which we all celebrate life and love for each other. If someone needs help, the whole community comes together to work and help. This is how the responsibility and love for your neighbors, friends and family.

The girl looks happily at her grandfather, who continues to explain: —La minga

It was created many years ago in indigenous communities with the aim that all inhabitants have a better life since, when everyone collaborates to achieve a dream, it is easier to achieve it. For this reason, some mingas are made to build family and communal houses, others to sow, to harvest and even to put fences, irrigation systems and other things necessary to live better.

And how can we thank you grandfather?


- Your mother and your grandmother are already preparing a delicious food to provide to all volunteers who come to work.



The grandfather calls Juan and together with his grandchildren he receives his friends. They all get down to work to build a new house in the community. The word minga comes from the Kichwa "minka". At the end of the minga, food and drink were shared. This activity is called pambamesa.
