Think of a first-class seat in the observation car on a Swiss train as it rolls gently through fairy-tale Alpine scenery, or a sumptuous silver-service meal aboard South Africa's Blue Train, or even a public service on a scenic country railway, perhaps in the West Highlands of Scotland, where stopping at tiny wayside stations is part of the charm. 'Slow travel by train is almost the only restful experience left to us,' my grandpa once told me.
