

## The first conditional

### FORM

*If + Subject + Simple Present verb + . . . , Subject + will + infinitive verb + . . .*

If you drop it, it'll break.

If you come at ten, we'll be ready.

If you phone me, I'll pick you up at the park.

*Subject + will + infinitive verb + . . . If + Subject + Simple Present verb + . . .*

It'll break if you phone me.

We'll be ready if you come at ten.

I'll pick you up later if you phone me.

### USE

- The first conditional refers to the future. It is used when there is a possibility that the if-event might happen.

*If it rains, we'll go to the cinema.* (= It might rain: it might not)

*If the sun shines, we'll go to the beach.* [= The sun might shine: it might not]

**Note:** *going to* is sometimes used in the first conditional to describe a future plan:

*If it rains, we're going to visit my mother.*
