

## Exclamatory or Interrogative Sentences

### RULES

An **imperative sentence** tells or asks someone to do something.  
Please help your father load up the wagon.

An **exclamatory sentence** shows a strong feeling.  
What an exciting day this is!

An imperative sentence ends with a period. An exclamatory sentence ends with an **exclamation mark**.

**An Imperative Sentence**  
tells someone to do something  
ends with a period (.)

**An Exclamatory Sentence**  
shows strong feeling  
ends with an exclamation mark (!)

EXAMPLE: Grease the wheels of the wagon. **Imperative**
