

Task #4



Do: When we talk about an activity without saying exactly what it is, we use "do".

"Do something!" "I like doing nothing."

"Do" is usually the correct word when we are talking about work.

"I'm not going to do any work."

"I dislike doing housework.

Let's get a maid to do all the boring jobs."

Make: "Make" often expresses the idea of creation or construction.

"I've just made a cake."

"Let's make a plan."

<u>In other cases there are no clear rules.</u> If you are not sure which word is correct, look in a good dictionary or choose "make" - it is more likely to be right.
