A DORUK - ISTANBUL

How about Turkey? I'm about to start at Koç University, 30 km from Istanbul city centre. It has a reputation for excellent teaching and international students are welcome. It would make a big difference if you learned some Turkish before coming, but don't worry about the classes – all of the university's undergraduate degrees are taught in English. When I visited, the campus seemed quite a close community and it's set in woods, so it feels as if you're in the middle of nowhere even though the city isn't far away. Istanbul itself is exciting because it's where the East meets the West and the old part of the city is a United Nations World Heritage Site.

B NATALIA - BARCELONA

It sounds as if you'd love Barcelona. The main university dates from the 1450s and there's a huge student population in the city, making it very culturally diverse. The inner city neighbourhoods are full of fascinating old buildings and squares with cool cafés. The city isn't all old, though. There are Gaudí's crazy, nature-inspired houses in the suburbs and incredible contemporary buildings like The Forum on the outskirts. La Rambla is always busy with people walking up and down looking at the stalls, but my favourite spot is Parc Güell, on a hillside behind the city. There's always a performance or something going on. I go up there all the time – I think I'll go again this weekend, but the bus leaves at six in the morning!

C SIMON - SYDNEY

It would make sense to go to an Australian university – they really cater for overseas students. I'm at Macquarie University and I love it. The campus is in the suburbs, surrounded by parkland, so it actually feels as if it's quite rural. There's a relaxed atmosphere and for me the only drawback is the location.
