

ADJECTIVES and ADVERBS (Revision exercises)



Adjectives describe **nouns** and usually come before them. Tom is a **good** tennis player.
Adjectives come after certain verbs: **appear, be, feel, look, seem, smell, sound, taste.**
 That man **seemed** kind.

Adverbs describe **verbs** and they usually end in **-ly** but there are some exceptions: **late, fast, hard, well**
 Tom reads **slowly**.
 Sarah plays the violin **well**.
